

Handling of Positive Spiking Wristbands

Purpose:

This crib sheet provides quick and essential guidance for venue staff and managers on how to respond if an anti-spiking wristband provides a positive result.

Step-by-Step Instructions

- 1. Immediate Action
 - If an individual informs you of a positive drug test result from their wristband, respond calmy and discreetly. Move them to a safe, quiet location within the venue. Ensure they are not left alone.
 - Ask the individual if they have consumed the tested drink
- 2. If the individual has not consumed the drink
 - Secure the drink for potential testing. Avoid touching it directly.
 - Inform venue security and management
 - Contact Police via online reporting or 101 to report the incident
 - Record details in in the venue's incident log, including time, the individual's condition and any actions taken.
 - Follow any other reporting procedures related to the venues licencing conditions
- 3. If the individual has consumed the drink
 - If the individual has consumed the drink ask the individual how they are feeling and if they need immediate medical assistance
 - Look for signs of distress, or adverse reactions such as confusion, dizziness, difficulty breathing, or other alarming symptoms.
 - Call emergency services if symptoms are severe or worsening
 - Contact the Police
 - Preserve the drink and any relevant evidence for the Police
 - Record details in in the venue's incident log, including time, the individual's condition and any actions taken.
 - Follow any other reporting procedures related to the venues licencing conditions

Information on Wristbands

These anti-spiking wristbands are designed to detect the presence of certain drugs. The individual tests the bands themselves. Each wristband allows the user to test the same drink twice or 2 different drinks.

A positive result suggests that the individual may have been exposed to drugs. This could pose a significant health risk, particularly if they are unaware or have taken a substance unknowingly.



Additional Information

Positive Result: The anti-spiking wristband will change colour from the light yellow/green colouring to a dark blue, dark green-blue, red-blue, violet-blue, brown-blue on the patch, if a drink has been tampered with.

Please note If the test accidently gets wet (washing hands, or raining), the test will turn blue. This indicates it has become wet only.
